

Constitution Legislative Committee

Corey Jenkins and Mike Morgan were thrilled to be part of the Constitution Legislative Committee. Establishing the Constitution at the Convening Conference was critical as it is the governing document of the Global Methodist Church. Constructing a constitution is very Wesleyan in that John Wesley believed steadfastly in the proper organization of the church. Our Constitution provides a schema for which our mission and ministry will function and grow the Church. In a few pages our foundational principles, the organization of the church and the Restrictive Rule are in true Methodist fashion concisely defined.

It was a blessing to be part of a committee (of 34 souls). Truly we did not begin our work with the same vision, yet every conversation and deliberation though intense and spirited were holy. A dozen hours or so were spent reforming the draft version provided in the Transitional Book of Doctrines and Discipline until we had full agreement.

However, this task was so important that though we thought our work complete, Chairperson Ryan Barnett reassembled us the next day, broke us into small groups to comb through – word by word the entire document. The result of this master stroke of leadership was several hours of spirited conversation, a handful of amendments, a unanimous vote an overwhelming feeling of gratitude that **NOW WE HAD A CONSTITUTION!**

At the recent GMC General Conference, the Holy Spirit's presence was deeply felt, not only in worship but also in our discussions, where mutual respect prevailed, even amid diverse viewpoints. In conclusion, this conference was a powerful testament to how the GMC is intentionally living out its commitment to inclusivity, not only in words but in actions. With Spirit-led conversations, a dedication to patient listening, and a focus on fostering diversity, we have set a course that reflects the heart of the gospel, preparing the church to flourish in a world that needs it more than ever.


"different". Very quickly it became apparent that indeed the presence of the Holy Spirit was felt by all and that this truly was going to be a much different experience than past UMC general conferences.


